Pope Memorial Frontier Animal Shelter 2013 - Celebrating a Special Year of Growth and Change!

The only thing constant in life is change. These words, written by a French author centuries ago, remain true today. Pope Memorial Frontier Animal Shelter is clear evidence of that!

This year, PMFAS is proudly celebrating 20 years of service to local communities, providing care and shelter to the homeless dogs and cats of Orleans and northern Essex Counties. We are also celebrating 10 years at our wonderful shelter in Orleans. Clearly, the organization has experienced change over the years!

Originally founded as The Frontier Animal Society of Vermont, Inc., the organization was started by a handful of Northeast Kingdom residents in March of 1993, most of whom had been associated with the Elizabeth Brown Humane Society. Finding that there was an even greater need to find homes for an ever growing population of homeless dogs and cats in the area, these local people formed a non-profit organization in order to benefit both the animals and the local communities.

A first priority – and a challenge – was to develop a solution to the problematic cat overpopulation and to do so humanely and ethically. From this need, a cat spay/neuter clinic was initiated. The clinic has grown and its services continue to be available to the public once or twice monthly at the shelter facility. It is estimated that over the past 20 years, approximately 14,000 cats have been spayed or neutered at these clinics, while also receiving necessary vaccines to prevent the spread of disease.

“During the shelter’s early years, all of our adoptable animals were housed and cared for through the kindness and generosity of local caring residents who volunteered to foster these animals in their own homes,” explains Betsy Hampton, one of the organization’s founders. “We have been fortunate in that the local veterinarians have also always been very generous and supportive of our efforts and we, in turn, have always strived to be financially responsible for their services.”

In 2001, a generous supporter was instrumental in financing a temporary shelter at the home of a volunteer who fostered dogs. During this time, the organization owned property in Newport which unfortunately did not meet the required Act 250 standards. Consequently, temporary kennels, and later a cattery, were located in Hardwick. While having a more permanent structure was advantageous, the location was disadvantageous as it was somewhat remote and not easily accessible for Orleans and Essex County residents.

After selling the Newport property, the organization’s Board of Directors decided to buy a piece of property in the Orleans Industrial Park. This property already met most of Act 250 requirements, and after getting all permits in place, Board members and supporters forged ahead to plan a building. “We were very fortunate to have a local architect named Arthur Postman work with us on the floor plans and kennel set up” recalls Betsy Hampton. “Many area businesses gave our organization free or reduced-cost services to help get our great shelter built. Our grand opening was in May of 2003.” Two years ago, Mr. Lyman Pope, a longtime supporter of several New England shelters, presented the Board with a

financial endowment to be used specifically for future capital expenses. In return, to commemorate this notable generosity, the shelter's name was changed to Pope Memorial Frontier Animal Shelter, Inc.

Indeed, while PMFAS has experienced some notable changes over the years, we continue to provide the same caring services to homeless cats and dogs in the Northeast Kingdom with the same mission of the past 20 years: To improve the welfare of the animals of Orleans and Essex Counties by sheltering and caring for lost and unwanted animals, spaying and neutering, placing animals in humane environments, and implementing programs to provide services for the promotion of responsible pet ownership.

In noting how special 2013 is with the 10 and 20 year anniversary, Board President Sherry Girard notes that the organization has been extremely fortunate in receiving so much support over the years from community members, businesses and energetic volunteers. "While we have recently received some endowment funds, we cannot emphasize enough that they are strictly to be utilized for very specific purposes such as spay/neuter services and any unforeseen major renovations that might be needed. We absolutely cannot use these funds for the day to day operations and services of the shelter. For these daily operations, just as we have for the past 20 years, we continue to rely on our fund raising efforts and on the generosity of the local communities we serve."

With change comes growth! Betsy Hampton further explains that "At any given time, there are over 65 animals in our care. Each year, for the past several years, the shelter has found forever homes for over 450 dogs and cats. That's more than one animal each day that finds a home after receiving food, care and health services at the shelter for an unlimited amount of time. Some are in our care for well over a year, even up to three years! It is our earnest hope that with the continued help from volunteers, ongoing commitment from local communities, and generous support from community members, the Pope Memorial Frontier Animal Shelter will be able to continue its mission for many years to come!"

The shelter, located at 4473 Barton Orleans Road (US Route 5) in Orleans, is celebrating its Anniversary by holding an open house and silent auction on Saturday, June 29 from 1 to 3 PM. The public is cordially invited to attend. Come and meet some of the wonderful animals that have their temporary home with us!

I really believe my new family loves me very much – the humans as well as all my new furry friends. Yup! I'm one lucky cat and I sure know it! In my case, all these changes have worked out for the very best. I am so thankful to all the folks at PMFAS for taking such good care of me for such a long time...and then finding me this great forever home! I surely hope things don't change now!
